Fast-Tracked Migraine Appointment Criteria

Use the checklist below to determine if a migraine patient qualifies for a fast-tracked appointment. For patients who are candidates, your referral will receive priority, with an appointment scheduled promptly. If your patient does not meet the criteria, we still make every effort to schedule appointments promptly. After treatment, the patient returns to the referring physician for follow-up care.
